In November, students from Travel and Tourism and Air Cabin Crew visited the annual World Travel Market at London Excel. The event was the biggest gathering of travel professionals worldwide and exposed our learners to the depth and breadth of this exciting, vibrant and growing industry.

Learners could visit and speak with various airlines, destination management companies, tourist boards, activity suppliers, hoteliers, technology companies and tour operators. Whilst at the event, they were able to explore the size of the industry, soak up the culture through learning traditional dances, sampling cultural foods, using VR headsets, explore immersive rooms and embrace the colourfulness and vibrancy of the multi-cultural event.

Part of the day involved travelling over to the O2 using the cable cars across the Thames to see one of London's largest entertainment venues, which will support future assessments.

The event was inspirational for all of our learners, they were able to learn about many new destinations and job roles within the industry.

IGLOO IMMERSIVE CLASSROOM

Recently, our Level 3 Motor Vehicle students became the first to experience a full lesson in our new immersive classroom, called The Igloo.

ANGLIA RUSKIN UNIVERSITY TRIP



COUNTY LINES CAMPAIGN





Our Level 3 Extended Diploma Graphic Design students collaborated with Suffolk Constabulary to create impactful campaigns aimed at raising awareness about County Lines. Through in-depth research, case studies, and personal storytelling, the students identified target audiences that resonated with them to develop their concepts and refine their designs.

Out of more than 30 submissions, one student's work stood out to PC Beavers for its strong visual and informative impact. Finley Wicks (work pictured) designed a campaign targeted at multiple audiences, utilising bold typography, striking monochromatic elements, and clean visuals to effectively communicate the powerful messages.

All of the student outcomes are now under review by a Suffolk Police Sergeant and will be shared with the Constabulary's graphic design team for use on their website.

These events are invaluable for our students' pathway to industry. All the students have done amazingly well.




MEDIA MAKE-UP = FAIRGROUND FRIGHTS


Over the six action-packed nights, students rose to the occasion demonstrating professionalism, speed and outstanding organisation, receiving very positive feedback from the event team and guests alike.

University

It's been a busy term for university applications, and it's great to see so many students enthusiastic about higher education. However, the application deadline is fast approaching, and while the official UCAS deadline is the 29th January 2025, we encourage all students to submit their applications as soon as they're ready. Universities are being reasonably quick, with offers coming in already, and a few students have already had or got interviews booked this side of Christmas for courses which require them (e.g.healthcare/auditions for performing arts, etc). If your young person is late in making an application, the option of university remains on the table until September/October 2025, and we are happy to support students with late applications and through the clearing process.

If students are still unsure of their choices, or even for first-year students who are keen to look into their options, a list of university open days can be found <u>HERE</u>.

CAREERS

Open days are exciting, but they will understand that they can feel overwhelming. If you're not able to/don't want to go on a busy day, reach out to the admissions teams of each university. Many will accommodate tours with student ambassadors on a 1:1 basis if needed. We have already had multiple sessions from universities such as UEA, Lincoln, UoS and Anglia Ruskin across all campuses.

On 7th March 2025, we are excited to partner with East Suffolk Council and MENTA to bring students an engaging and informative Careers event designed to empower them with the knowledge and confidence to make informed decisions about their future, whether it's continuing education, starting apprenticeships, or entering the workforce.

The event will give students a great opportunity to:

- Gain insights into the skills and qualifications needed for different career paths.
- Explore apprenticeships, college courses, and alternative education options.
- Attend interactive workshops on CV writing, interview skills, and career planning.

This will be held at the Lowestoft College and Sixth Form.
